President's Message



I would like to wish all IAS members and associates a very happy New Year, with 2012 being the Year of the Dragon. The Chinese New Year celebrations are now over and our hosts of the 6th World Congress for Allelopathy in Guangzhou and all conference participants are now reflecting back on a very successful meeting, held at the Hotel Canton from

December 15-19 in the old city of Guangzhou. The surrounds included lovely older buildings, shopping districts, tree lined streets and parks, and many hotels and restaurants. I would like to sincerely thank our hosts and conference organizers, Prof. Shiming Luo and Rensen Zeng, and their competent staff of postgraduate and undergraduate students for an excellent conference. With mild weather and over 220 registered attendees from 35 countries present, the meeting commenced on Thursday December 15 with a welcome dinner and the IAS board meeting. The conference was opened on Friday December 16 by introductory remarks from the President of Southern China Agricultural University, and conference organizer Professor Luo Shiming. The society appreciates the efforts of S. China Ag University which provided major support as the host institution for the 6th World Congress.

The conference was kicked off each day with an excellent series of keynote addresses which covered topics ranging from allelopathy and the search for novel modes of action from allelochemicals, soil rhizosphere interactions and impacts upon allelochemical persistence, plant allelopathy and insect/fungal interactions, localization of allelochemicals and their release into the rhizosphere, improving our publications in the field of allelopathy, and future trends in publication of allelopathy research. The meeting was divided into various topics for oral presentations and posters, with up to 3 concurrent sessions running daily. All were well attended. The conference also featured an entertaining banquet featuring singing by our hosts and other participants, and a field trip to southern Canton production areas where we visited areas of

horticultural production, glasshouse production, a historic Chinese village from the Guangzhou region, and the lights of modern Guangzhou City at night. The business meeting was held at the conclusion of the conference on Monday afternoon, with the presentation of IAS awards for outstanding research (Molisch Award), publication (Grodzinsky Award) and oral communication by students (Rice Award). Congratulations and awards plaques were provided to Drs. Prasanta Bhowmik and Francisco Macias, joint winners of the Molisch Award, Dr. Rensen Zeng, winner of the Grodzinsky Award and winner Changxun Fang of the Rice Award. The IAS Board introduced Dr. Manuel Reigosa, host of the upcoming 7th World Congress of Allelopathy, to be held in Vigo Spain in July 2014. Dr. Reigosa described the lovely and historical surroundings that await conference participants travelling to Vigo in 2014 with a slide presentation. It should be a great event and we look forward to another fantastic congress, this time in Europe. The new IAS board was introduced, after several dedicated members stepped down from their respective posts and were acknowledged for their hard work and efforts. Catherine Fernandez of France was introduced and agreed to serve as IAS secretary, replacing Inderjiit, and David Gealy of USA has agreed to serve as treasurer, replacing Prasanta Bhowmik. The society also thanked Yoshiharu Fujii of Japan for his service as past president, Steve Duke of USA for his dedicated service as president, and introduced Leslie Weston of Australia as incoming President. The new Vice President is Rensen Zeng of China. Five new international delegates will also be appointed to serve as advisors to the IAS Board. In the final minutes of the 6th World Congress, the board and audience thanked the conference organizers for their efforts in organizing such a successful event. Well done and thanks to all who travelled from afar to attend! Research results from selected presentations will be showcased in upcoming issues of Plant and Soil and Journal of Chemical Ecology in 2012. IAS Editor Azim Mallik and John Romeo, Editor of Chemical Ecology will be working to coordinate these efforts in 2012, and we look forward to viewing these outstanding contributions in press.

Report by Dr. Rensen Zeng

The 6th World Congress on Allelopathy (6th WCA) of the International Allelopathy Society (IAS) was held in the Guangzhou, China from December 15 to 19, 2011. This congress was hosted by South China Agricultural University leading by the Chair of Organization Committee and Program Vice President of IAS Prof. Shiming Luo and the Co-chair and Secretary Prof. Rensen Zeng. The theme of the 6th WCA is "Allelopathy

Research for Sustainable Development - from theory to practice". The meeting received over 220 registered attendees from 35 countries around five continents. In the opening ceremony, IAS President Dr. Stephen Duke gave an opening address and President of South China Agricultural University, Prof. Xiaoyang Chen, delivered a welcome speech.

The congress invited 13 plenary speakers including Dr. Anne Osbourn from John Innes Centre

at Norwich Research Park (UK), Prof. Guodong Wang from Chinese Academy of Sciences (China), Dr. Stephen Duke from USDA –ARS (USA), Prof. Leslie Weston from Charles Sturt University (Australia), Prof. Azim Mallik from Lakehead University (Canada), Dr. Yoshiharu Fujii from National Institute for Agro-Environmental Sciences (Japan), Prof. Inderjit from University of Delhi (India), Prof. Prasanta C. Bhowmik from University of Massachusetts (USA), John Romeo from University of South Florida (USA) and Jingquan Yu from Zhejiang University (China). The congress had 138 oral presentations and 106 posters from 11 diverse symposiums :

including (1) Allelopathy in agriculture (divided into 4 subsections) , (2) Allelopathy in horticulture and forestry, (3) Allelopathy in natural ecosystems, (4) Allelopathy and rhizosphere ecology, (5) Allelopathy and invasive plants, (6) Chemistry of allelochemicals,

(7) Allelochemical interactions and environmental fate of allelochemicals, (8) Allelopathy: methodology and modeling, (9) Physiology, biochemistry and molecular biology of allelopathy, (10) Allelopathy mechanisms, (11) Plant – microbe and Plant – insect interactions. During the congress, the IAS committee meeting and business meeting were held. The IAS constitution and bylaws were amended, and new president and officers were elected in the congress. The new IAS board includes Leslie Weston of Australia as new president, Steve Duke of USA as past president, Catherine Fernandez of France as IAS secretary, David Gealy of USA as treasurer, Rensen Zeng of China as president-elect and Manuel Reigosa of Spain as Program Vice President. The IAS issued the Molisch Award to Drs. Prasanta Bhowmik and Francisco Macias, the Grodzinsky Award to Dr. Rensen Zeng, the Rice Award to Changxun Fang. The society decided to have the 7th World Congress of Allelopathy in Vigo of Spain in July 2014.

Financial report by Pr. Luo Shiming

As the Chair of Local Organizing Committee of the congress,



I would like to give you the financial report of this congress. We received 3,540 US\$ IAS membership fee from 55 persons in Guangzhou. This amount will be transferred to the appointed bank account of IAS as required. The total registration fee collected from participants was 41,841.82 US\$. The total expenditure was 75,312.76 US\$.

The subsidy for 30 participants from 14 countries reached 15.97% of the total expenditure, or 28.74% of the registration fee collected. The registration fee covered 55.56% of the total expenditure. Other 44.44% was covered by donation received from 5 donors including South China Agricultural University, National Natural Scientific Foundation of China, State Key Laboratory of Conservation and Utilization of

Subtropical Agro-bioresources, Key Discipline Development Project of Guangdong Education Bureau, and Bio-Key Scientific Equipment Company. The surplus according to the financial balance was 656.05 US\$. The decision made by IAS committee meeting in Guangzhou was that half of the surplus would belong to the IAS and half of it would belong to the AAS. So, 328.03 US\$ will also be transferred to the IAS bank account along with the IAS membership fee. Another 328.03 US\$ will be transferred to the AAS bank account.

Business meeting

Treasurer's report by Dr Prasanta Bhowmik

Financial report

As Treasurer of the International Allelopathy Society,



I am pleased to report that we had a successful Sixth World Congress in Guangzhou, China. We all thank Prof. Shimming Luo and Prof. Rensen Zeng for hosting such a conference. Also, I personally thank them for collecting IAS membership fees at the congress.

The local Organizing Committee received \$75,968.81 as congress registration fees and others. The expenses for the congress were \$75,312.76. Thus, the congress had a net balance of \$656.05. According

to IAS Bylaws, IAS treasury receives 50% and the other half goes to Regional Allelopathy Society. Thus, IAS has received a surplus/misc amount of \$328.03 from the Sixth World Congress. A detailed report is available from Prof. Shimming Luo.

IAS Membership status

Our membership has remained in flux at The Sixth World Congress in Guangzhou, China. A total membership fee of \$3,540.00 was collected from 55 individuals, including 42 regular and 13 student memberships.

Currently, we have a total of only 74 paid members, including 13 life members (Table 1). It is interesting to note that 13 new students registered at the Sixth World Congress, Guangzhou, China. However, 15 student members who registered at the Fifth World Congress, Saratoga Springs, USA did not continue their membership. Also, it is important to know that there are 73 members who paid their dues at the Fifth World Congress have not yet renewed their membership in 2012. A detailed membership list has been developed and will be handed over to the new treasurer.



Included in the congress, we will visit Vigo, Baiona medieval castle and the mouth of the Miño River, border to Portugal



Venue

The Congress will be celebrated the last week of July, 2014 (tentative dates: 28-31 July + 1 day for visits). The Congress will take place in the Caixanova convention center, that includes two historical buildings located in the same street.

First building is the Theatre. It has two very big and artistic rooms, plus two places adequate for poster showing and four small meeting rooms.

1. Main room

The theatre includes two main rooms adequate for main sessions (pictures 1, 2 and 5)

2. Poster sessions

Usually posters are exhibited in the corridors. Figure 4 shows one of the possible places for poster sessions

3. Other rooms

In the same building many other rooms are prepared, from 50 to 150 people attending and all the audiovisual facilities.

4. Social Centre

Just crossing the street, there is another centre specialized in congresses. In this case, an old stone building holds a completely new and reformed set of rooms totally devoted to congresses (picture 3).



Vigo city

Vigo is a city that has its roots in the pre-roman celtic civilization. Romans liked the surroundings and the fishing and there are several archeological sites from Roman empire.

1. El Castro Hill
From this hill, an old castle built to control pirate ships dominates the old town and the Ria
2. The old town
Although most of the city of Vigo is quite new (s. XIX-XX) there are still some interesting buildings from older times, including several pre-roman and roman places
3. Castrelos park
In this park there are interesting gardens, with many different autochthonous and exotic species and a medieval palace.

Getting to Vigo

Vigo is easy to reach and is well connected within a network of roads and motorways that link all the main towns and cities in Galicia, the rest of Spain and internationally. The port, airport, road and rail network provide a wide range of travel options suitable to all.



By Road:

There are three main routes:

- The Northwest Dual Carriageway links Vigo to Madrid and the central plain (667km).
- The Rías Baixas Dual Carriageway from Vigo to the motorway to northern Portugal, passing through Tui, Braga and Porto and going on to Lisbon. It also links up with the motorway from Vigo to Baiona.
- The Atlántico Motorway links Vigo to northern Galicia, passing by Pontevedra, Santiago and A Coruña.

By Bus:

Main routes are from Vigo to Madrid, Barcelona, Asturias, Bilbao, Irún, San Sebastián, Zaragoza,

Extremadura, Andalucía, among others. There are also international routes to Portugal (Porto, Lisbon and the Algarve), France, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, Denmark and Germany.

Arriving to Vigo

Vigo airport receives flights from Paris, Madrid and Barcelona

Three airports in Galicia, one in Porto. There are other two airports in Galicia (NW Spain): Lavacolla (Santiago de Compostela) and the smallest A Coruña. Lavacolla is an international airport, although the connection to Vigo is not very easy. Porto airport is a big one, connecting major destinations in Europe and South America. It could be a good alternative to Vigo airport.

2. From the airport to the city
For pre-designed days, a University bus will work as a shutter for transport of the people coming to the Congress. There is also a very cheap bus, and the taxi fares are fixed and cheap (17€ in 2011)

3. Visiting the city
There are touristic buses you can stop and jump again in the next bus, spending some time in each stop. But we will offer a visit to Vigo free of charge

4. Ship transportation
There is a quite cheap transport to the surrounding villages in the Ria of Vigo. The boat station is very close to the congress venue.

5. Other destinations
Galicia is full of different landscapes and cities that are worthwhile to visit. We are including a bunch of different possible visits to perform during and after the congress

Hotels

Hotels and residences are standard. Many different prices are available. The situation of the Congress venue is excellent to use many different hotels. There will be an offer of university residence rooms, especially for students both in the campus and the city.

2. The castle


In the old castle (2), there is a hotel (5).

Allelopathy.

Advances and uses of Allelopathy

The congress should include all the topics that are active in research related to allelopathy

Two satellite meetings

The main lines of the congress proposals should not be really different from previous congresses. But we should like to include two additional one-day mini-symposia in fields that are close to allelopathy but not really dealing everyday with it: Weeds and invasive plants and Organic Farming

Weeds

Weed science in Europe is quite active, and we feel that we could attract some of the main scientists working on invasive species to a mini-symposium. They should be considered as fully participants in the congress, and all the discussion should be wellcome.

Organic Farming

European Societies for the

Development of Organic Farming have interesting field demonstrations of allelopathic effects... even without naming it. The use of mulches, intercropping and other agricultural systems that allow diminishing the use of pesticides are a field that is quite near to allelopathy. Another section should be provided for those



scientists.

European initiatives

We should also try to attract to the congress those scientists involved in COST actions related (directly or indirectly) to allelopathy. We should provide a forum for them to disseminate their results, and they should also benefit of knowing the state-of-the art in allelopathy

Key points

Including the best speakers

Those who are most active in publishing, trying to cover all the possible approaches.

Including scientists from other fields

One of the most interesting characteristics of IAS is that it is an open scientific society, corresponding to an open mind. We need to learn from others... and let them learn about actual research in this particular field

Including two satellite sessions

We need more scientists who are not mainly involved in allelopathy research to consider this phenomenon as a possible explanation for what they see in the field and as a possible way to act on ecosystems.

This especially wellcome for scientists working on weed control and on organic farming
